




I learned something by participating in this library activity.





I am likely to apply what I have learned.






Overall, I think the workshop was excellent.


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How did you hear about the workshop?





What were the strong points of the program?

- The various types of solutions that were used
- Hearing how different libraries (i.e. public and academic) were able to adapt quickly and efficiently at the beginning of the pandemic and how to continue the changes made moving forward as the city, state, and country open up.
- Joanne Bailey did an excellent job talking about how she worked with staff and empowered them during a pandemic. Excellent points made regarding cross-training and recognizing our work may look different moving forward. I was also really impressed by the information Dana M (SCLD) put together to show us about what they have learned about offering virtual programs and when it has worked and hasn't worked. She was extremely encouraging and I felt energized to move forward with a variety of programs and to simply try!
- Variety of topics and services covered

What were the strong points of the program? Cont.

- all the great ideas for outreach like partnering with Meals of Wheels. I am from an academic library so found balancing creation of online content with continuous assessment and job evaluations interesting
- very informative
- Hearing from individuals who do the work. Practical rather than hypothetical
- Hearing what others have done normalized 2 things: 1. That what I and my library did was in line with our local norms. 2. That all our libraries saw and responded to the differing needs of our different communities.
- Different methods of programming and what will work in the future
- Hearing needs of area customers
- It was online- no traveling.
- The breadth of perspectives covered. The timeliness of the topic.

COMMENTS or SUGGESTIONS about the program?

- I won't necessarily use all of the information, but it was interesting to hear what people have been doing over the past year
- I love that all our responses were emphasized such varied services. I'm amazed, but not surprised, at the strength of everyone's creative responses to pandemic services.
- Excellent program, excellent moderation (and co-moderators/support). Very good presentations and I enjoyed learning from other organizations about what they were doing around the various topics.
- Shorten the length or provide a break.

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What were the weaknesses of the program?

- I didn't think there were any weaknesses/Can't think of any/None
- Could have used more free form discussion time
- For me, it turned out to be too long. The polls were fun - they helped. I needed a physical break after an hour. After 1.5 hours, it felt too long.
- Heavily weighted towards public libraries. Need more academic library participation
- I listened to the recording and would have appreciated it if the poll questions and possible answers, when applicable, were read out loud for the benefit of those not attending live. In my opinion, it worked best to allow questions after each presenter, vs. holding questions for the 3 presenters who were talking about programming until after the last presentation on that topic--I understand the reasoning behind holding the questions, but feel we could have benefitted more from being able to ask questions right after each speaker (better flow, more questions for the first two presenters).
- I wouldn't say this is a weakness of the program exactly, but as library staff rather than a current librarian, many things weren't relevant to my current position. It was still useful information to me though.
- Length - a bit long
- Need more variations of libraries.
- Not all the speakers' visual presentations were equally engaging, but that's normal in a volunteer panel.
- No weaknesses! Bailey and the LCLD team did a great job pulling off a Zoom conference.
- Not enough time for questions, especially for the last three panelists.
- Public library/Academic library split- not always relevant
- Rushed at the end
- Some of the programs were not applicable to me (such as library instruction at universities), but it was okay.
- Start time
- Too long, heavy focus on public library programming which was not as relevant to my job.
- Virtual. Couldn't show everything I wanted to
